Smart Business Resource Center is excited to announce our expansion to serve more communities in Northern California!

Smart began as the Private Industry

Council (PIC) in 1979, serving Shasta

County with workforce services. In 2008, we added Trinity to our serving area. In 2018, we began serving Humboldt County and we are humbled and excited to begin serving Del Norte and Siskiyou Counties beginning July 1 of this year.

As we add counties, we gain the opportunity to streamline services by aligning management and staff in an efficient model that allows for maximum service delivery and better participant experience. This combining of forces will provide for new and improved accessibility



to businesses and job seekers. Innovations include, but are not limited to, forward technology, virtual services, improved communication, and a more centralized business and operations. These are just part of the many progressive changes happening at Smart.

Smart will have brick and mortar locations in all counties we serve. These will include One Stop Job Centers with access to computers, resume and cover letter software, job postings and assistance with online job applications, skill-building workshops, and more!

Our physical locations will be located in Redding (Shasta), Weaverville (Trinity), Eureka (Humboldt), Crescent City (Del Norte) and Weed (Siskiyou). Check out our next quarterly newsletter for address information and pictures of each of our locations.

In addition to our physical locations, we are in the process of launching a new website, with comprehensive resources specific to each of the counties we serve, as well as interactive features for job

Training Partners, growing a better tomorrow

Smart Career Advisors, Chris Ormsby and Laura Barbeau, took a tour of the Providence International farm site on June 22, 2020. Providence



International is a private non-profit, with several projects aimed at healthy eating, sustainable environment, and sustainable wage employment. They lease 200 acres of beautiful City of Redding land along the river off Riverland Drive.

Their vision is to create demonstration gardens, greenhouses, and orchards, highlighting sustainability, efficient water usage, and clean energy. They also want to offer an Interpretive Center offering guided educational tours. The goal is to increase healthy food production locally to people experiencing food insecurity, as well as provide research and information to the general public in support of small farming. Plans for this park site include a River Walk, vegetable, fruit and nut crops, riparian and native plantings, and wind and solar demonstrations. Providence offers job and life skills training and placement for at-risk adults and young adults.

To date, they have planted a large orchard, as well as vegetable gardens, installed irrigations systems, fencing, and electrical power. They need donations, workers, volunteers, and consultants who can provide assistance to them in farming practices using conservation and renewable energies. Smart is exploring potential training and employment opportunities for our job seekers who would like to gain experience in nutrition and organic food production. Providence International is also established at a smaller S. Redding location, 3626 Railroad Avenue, called Providence Garden of Hope.








Unprecedented Times Call for Unprecedented Response

Trinity County Unemployment spiked in April to 12.7%. May showed a slight improvement at 10.7%, but still well over the 2-year running average of around 6%. During this time, SMART has stepped up to assist businesses and employees going



through this tumultuous change. Over the last quarter, SMART has reached out to 51 businesses to provide services and assistance during layoff and closure events. SMART has assisted 147 businesses and their employees with Information, training, and Supportive services navigating the changes impacting our local economy.



NOW HIRING

While the quarter has experienced a significant number of businesses closing temporarily or permanently, there are also many businesses in need of workers. In the last quarter, 256 businesses have worked with SMART to post nearly 200 job listings and receive additional assistance. SMART has helped 75 different businesses navigate CalJOBS. Over 270 times, a business has worked with SMART to make a job referral.

Storm and Carr Fire Grant Update

The Smart Business Resource Center received a \$475,000 National Dislocated Worker Gran (NDWG)t to help with clean-up following the winter storms in 2019. The funding has provided 13 workers at the City of Redding, Caltrans and Mountain Gate Community Services District.

The Smart Center's NDWG Carr Fire grant, also received in 2019, was able to employ 35 workers, focusing on sites within Whiskeytown N.R.A. and the City of Redding. Kristi Hanson, the Smart Special Grants Career Advisor commented, "We have seen tremendous progress on clean-up of both natural disasters, were able to put people back to work and steward great working relationships. Five participants have secured permanent positions during their tenure as temporary workers."

NDWG grants are typically for laborer and repair jobs. They fund additional workers to work alongside permanent employees working on clean-up. The positions provide temporary jobs to people who are unemployed allowing to work and gain transferrable skills to add to their resume.

Business Success Story Amid a Pandemic Crisis Western Business Products

An initial outreach call to the copier business (an outbound "proactive" calling and email effort checking on the needs of our local businesses during the shelter-in-place), revealed that the copier business had worked with Smart in the past and had nothing but good results with our OJT candidates.

Amid a weary and unpredictable time in the Business world, one of our local businesses agreed to use the Smart Business Resource Center's OJT program once again this month to fill positions needed for expansion. Reluctant to hire two additional needed employees, the Smart Business Services Representative assured the business manager that Smart could deliver excellent training services as in the past.






Western Business Products partners with SMART

Smart is Proud to Serve our Community as an Essential Service with COVID Grants and Job Services

The Smart Business Resource Center is proud to be considered an essential business during the COVID-19 crisis. We continue to take necessary precautions to ensure the safety of our employees, our clients, and our businesses, but we never stopped operations. We are happy to share that we are open for business virtually and in person by appointment and will continue to provide our best assistance to businesses and job seekers.



Smart Rapid Response services were provided virtually in April, May and June to many businesses who either closed, or that had to lay off staff. Rapid Response provides employers with necessary support during difficult decisions and transitions, and it provides employees with critical resources to gain Unemployment Insurance and begin their reemployment journey with education assistance, training, and job placement services.

Smart realized an increase in online job postings to our Jobs List daily. Unlike other job posting boards, our Smart job board is operated by a local person, who curates and validates all job postings. When COVID first happened, our Job Posting Specialist was able to call all businesses with job openings to verify if the posting was still needed, if it needed to change, or if it needed to be taken down. Smart was proud to offer the most up-to-date job posting information in our serving area, helping our local job seekers be more effective in their job search, and minimizing unnecessary work for our businesses during that time.

Additionally, Smart received emergency grants in response to the COVID-19 crisis. These grants provide an opportunity for individuals laid off due to COVID to gain temporary employment responding to the COVID crisis clean-up. Sites and jobs available include: Sanitization at libraries, public parks, and public

buildings; food bank assistance in food preparation, warehouse work, and food deliveries to vulnerable people in our communities; answering phones in call centers answering public health and assistance questions; sanitization of non-profit organizations; and more! While the jobs are temporary, they can lead to permanent employment with these employers.

Finally, Smart received a Supportive Service grant that helps job seekers with up to either \$400 or \$800, depending on eligibility, for emergency assistance for rent, utilities (gas, electric, garbage, cable, water, phone, internet), car repairs, tires (vehicle must be registered and insured in the participant's name), interview clothes, work clothes and child care (with a licensed child care provider).
