


#### Smart Partners with New Life Discovery Project

In an example of resilience and determination, Christine, a client referred by the Employment Development Department (EDD), transformed her challenging search into a rewarding career path dedicated to helping those in need.

When Christine arrived for her mock interview, she quickly connected with her advisor, sharing a compelling backstory and a passion for supporting individuals facing hardships. Her own experiences had given her a unique understanding of the difficulties faced by those navigating life's toughest challenges, particularly the homeless.

Armed with constructive feedback, Christine revised her resume and hit

#### Andrew Finds Success on the Road

SMART has assisted Andrew at both Trinity and Shasta One-Stop Career Centers. After doing some occupational research, he inquired about obtaining a certificate in Commercial Driving. One of the many services that the workforce center offers, includes assisting individuals who are looking to complete an Occupational Skills Training Program. Although Andrew had long-term experience working as a cook, he had decided it was time for growth. He was interested in a career change as well as a lifestyle change. After he was made eligible for tuition assistance, he



became enrolled in one of the local truck driving schools, American Career Training. He completed 160 hours of training for his commercial driver's license, entailing lectures and homework as well as hands on training. Once his training was complete, he took his behind the wheel driving test and passed, granting him his commercial driver's license. Soon after, he was hired as a regional Heavy Truck driver for May Trucking. Andrew's story is one of the many that has inspired the community and thanks to the services that SMART offers, will continue to be a resource to residents who are seeking career assistance that could change their lives for the better..



## Terry Builds His Better Tomorrow

Terry came to SMART with the goal of securing full-time employment. He was eligible for the Regional Equity & Recovery Partnerships (RERP) grant, which assists individuals who were formerly incarcerated, justice-involved, or belong to other eligible populations. Terry had valuable customer service experience from working in hardware stores, but he faced the challenge of traveling on foot.

Despite this barrier, Terry showed determination and actively participated in his job search. With the dedicated support of his career advisor, he was placed in an On-the-Job Training program at Trinity Lumber and Building Supply. Terry's hard work and commitment quickly became evident, and it was clear he was a perfect fit for the role. His efforts paid off, and he was retained as a full-time employee.

## **Smart Partners with Human Response Network**

The Human Response Network (HRN) is a small nonprofit organization dedicated to providing essential social services to the residents of Trinity County, located in far Northern California. Established with the mission of supporting and empowering the local community, HRN offers a variety of programs designed to address the unique needs of individuals and families in the region. HRN has participated in SMART's On-the-Job Training (OJT) program, a workforce development initiative designed to provide hands-on job training for eligible participants. This partnership allowed us to offer an opportunity for an individual that was a displaced homemaker of ten years. The OJT allowed her to gain practical experience while receiving mentorship and guidance. It helps to builds skills that can lead to long-term employment, boost confidence, and increase her opportunity to reach self-sufficiency. Together these partnership efforts contribute to the overall strength and resilience of the individual, the businesses, and the community.



#### E3- Summer Youth- Shasta



This first year in Shasta County, E<sub>3</sub> was a collaboration with the SMART Workforce Center, Redding Chamber of Commerce, Shasta County Office of Education, Shasta College, and the Cradle to Career initiative Reach Higher Shasta. SMART successfully held the first Shasta E<sub>3</sub> Summer Bootcamp!


The E<sub>3</sub> (Experience Education and Employment) is a paid internship program for local high school students. E<sub>3</sub> was initially incepted by SMART Supervisor Christy and her team in Del Norte and in partnership with the Del Norte County Office of Education, and local businesses in 2017. The mission was to give younger generations the opportunity to gain work readiness skills and receive mentorship through hands on paid work experience with local businesses.

The Shasta E<sub>3</sub> program took many months of planning and coordination with partners, students, and businesses.

SMART paved the way for the Bootcamp workshops, with Betsey and Rachelle assisting in program coordination and presentations. D'Art and Chelsea introduced topics during the week to help

prepare the students for success in their internships. Carrian and Chelsea provided breakfast and lunch for the students; they also went to work locating businesses to develop paid Internships.

14 students successfully complete their internships with the following businesses: Shasta County Office of Education (SCOE), Redding School District, Shasta Regional Medical Center, Shasta Community Health Center, Dignity Health Connected Living, and Mayers Health Care Foundation/Mayers Memorial Hospital. Of those 14 students, 7 elected to do concurrent enrollment with Shasta College to earn 2 college credits in either Early Childhood Education or Allied Health. SMART monitored progress to ensure they met the required hours.




## Trinity County Labor Market Update:

As of August 2024, In Trinity County, the civilian work force has expanded recently to 4,870 this includes everyone that is working, and everyone that is looking for work. Of those, 4,610 are currently employed.

The unemployment rate is 5.3% for August, this is up slightly from 5.2% at the same time last year, but down from a peak

earlier in 2024.

In raw numbers there are approximately 260 people currently considered unemployed in the county. Compared to 250 in August of 2023. Things are very similar year over year.

Unemployment being similar to last year, businesses may find it difficult to fill labor needs. Fortunately, SMART offers assistance to businesses, in the form of On-The-Job training reimbursement and training programs for their employees.

Through SMART's funded On the Job Training programs we can help reduce risk when hiring a new employee. As this labor shortage creates complications for employers in the county, SMART can be there to help employers navigate it.

Employers may also need to rethink how they recruit and fill their labor needs. There are untapped labor pools not traditionally counted in the unemployed numbers. Retirees looking for something to do, college students just about to enter the labor pool, parolees who have just completed their prison terms, and homemakers thinking about reentering the work force are not included in the unemployed numbers. Businesses can tap those resources but will likely need to adjust their thinking of what the job demands. Retirees or students may not want or be able to accommodate a 40 hour a week position. Perhaps someone lacks the skills needed to perform the work but has strong motivation to learn.

This is where SMART can help. We can connect businesses to candidates that employers may not have had access to, or even knew were options. SMART clients come from all walks of life and are looking for careers today. As the county's pool of candidates to hire continues to shrink, SMART can assist businesses filling their labor needs.
